the West." We'll keep you posted on all of the decisions in the pages of THE TRAIL RIDER.



Thanks to Wrangler Gary




Bud Buster Says . . .




Speaking of the Maverick Brothers, nothing adds more to an evening of poker than good conversation. For those Trail Riders who wish to accept


the Maverick Brothers Poker Club invitation, here's what Bud Buster says will help keep the evening's tack a movin' as conversation starters:


